Rishi Bankim Chandra for women is currently having the following mechanisms for effective delivery of curriculum. i) At the beginning of an academic session departmental meetings are held in every department in which the topics in the syllabus are distributed to the teachers after discussion with them. ii) Number of classes for each topic is decided according to the syllabus and credit assigned to each topic/group/paper etc. iii) College administration provides a well constructed routine/schedule/time table for each year/semester both UG and PG classes. iv) Routine committee prepares the routine which is approved by the principal. v) Teachers prepare their lecture according to the syllabus allotted and classes available. vi) We have a central library with open access system and many departments have their Departmental libraries too for the benefit of the students. A few Journals are subscribed by our college Infolibnet (e-books and e-journals) facility is available for teachers and also for the students. vii) Various classroom teaching methods based on various needs of different subjects are regularly used for the effective delivery of the curriculum such as A) Chalk and Blackboard method B) ICT enabled teaching-learning method. C) Use of different softwares. D) Use of Scientific models and charts for effective lecture delivery. E) Distribution of class notes by teachers. F) Group discussion amongst the students during the class. G) Micro-teaching and seminars by students related to curriculum. H) Paper presentation by the

students. I) Proper and adequate instrumentation facility is given to the students for their practical classes; there is also a central instrumentation facility for that purpose. J). Need based survey programmes, field works and educational excursions are carried by the departments. K) Project work, dissertations are conducted for fulfilment of their degrees. L) Seminars and special talks by experts are also arranged regularly for advance studies. Regular class tests, Mid-term examinations, Mid-semester examinations, regular assessment in practical classes, viva voce, are done to keep track of the improvement of the studies. Remedial and tutorial classes are also conducted based on requirement. Departments maintain the detailed record of the classes, assessments, project reports etc. College administration also keeps a vigilant eye on the results, departmental proceedings and student needs and also keeps record of the different activities of the college regarding teaching, learning, development and improvements of different methods of effective curriculum delivery.

Feedback Obtained
A 100 online survey of all student has been done. It is mandatory for all the students to submit their online feedback form. The Institute has designed the questionnaire to assess students satisfaction and dissatisfaction towards their need, objectives, purpose of study and goals. The questionnaire was designed under four heads- Teaching learning and Evaluation, Academic Infrastructure, Students support system and students progression. The questionnaire is pre scheduled to determine the choice of subjects, correlation between the theory and practical or field survey application of computers and smart class, departmental laboratories, overall infrastructural facilities (including

drinking water, sanitation etc) library facilities, internal evaluation system, caring to students grievances, adequacy of teachers towards their teaching, communicating encouraging skills and overall behavioural attitude and ranking their relation with their teachers throughout, services obtained from administration and office staffs students participation in extracurricular activities, relation with the students union etc. The feedback analysis gives a complete reflection of the attitude of the students to the institution which helps the institution immensely for the overall development. The students are categorised according to their subjects and analysed as laboratory based and non laboratory based students. The overall feedback analysis shows most of the academic infrastructure (size of the classroom, etc). Most of them are satisfied with the library facility and the data analysis shows that nearly 80 of students will talk about the institution proudly and the rest have indifferent opinions about the institution.
